

THE 5 MOST UNFAIR CONDITIONS in Educational Licences in Europe

Educational licences for using copyrighted content in schools include many terms and conditions that restrict users' rights and that are unfair or unreasonable. We present the 5 most unfair conditions based on an analysis of 10 licences:

Condition	Why is it unfair?
Licensor can inspect materials, secured	Does not prevent licensors from disclosing
